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Day of Giving 2025: A strong day for Caldwell Fellows

Alumni support on the Day of Giving provides income for the annual programmatic budget. Once again, the shared efforts of this alumni community were generous, **yielding \$175,616**. Our targeted fund, **The Gerald Hawkins Endowment**, will generate income for the program for years to come. Our students earned bragging rights (and the bonus money) for having the most student donors (98 gifts). Additionally, two students found hidden wolves, earning us \$1,000; one student won the student referral link challenge, earning the program another \$1,000, and one student earned us \$400 by answering questions about the Day of Giving.

Coaching Survey

The Caldwell Fellows program has recruited, encouraged, and sponsored CF alumni to receive coaching certification (CPC) for the past 4 years. The current cohort of 5 alumni will graduate in July, bringing the number to 16 who have completed the program-sponsored training. The original intent with these alumni coaches was (and still is) to work with the current Caldwell Fellows. Coach trainees have also provided coaching to young alumni (10 years or less since graduation). The significant interest in coaching from young alumni, coupled with our own life and career trajectories, tells us that ALL of our alumni could be interested in the opportunity to be in a coaching relationship. We are reaching out to gauge interest. In addition to the gift of coaching, this also provides an opportunity to (re)engage with groups of your fellow CF alumni.

Message from the Director



Money is a powerful force. We each have a story about our relationship with money.

I was raised in a family of six where we had, thankfully, enough of what we needed. My parents' Depression era childhoods embedded in them, and subsequently me, a frugal outlook. I grew up wary of money. From age 10, I found ways to earn money, which I dutifully saved. I was determined to pay my way through life. I was averse to spending money and thought warily of those who overspent or measured personal worth by money. Then, in my thirties, I heard a speaker whose story with money significantly mirrored my own. Her insight was that being burdened by the fear of spending money is another end of the spectrum of being controlled by money. What an unexpected aha!

With a new lens, I became less obsessed with frugality and more aware that my values of generosity, lifelong learning, and joyful living can align with how I use my resources. It was a freeing insight.

The Day of Giving and Shack-A-Thon in the same week ignited my reflection on money. How we use the resources in our control is one of the most powerful indicators of our core values. We owe our existence to the values of the Richardson Foundation, who in the early 1960s envisioned the development of talented, committed university students for servant leadership as a path of positive social impact. They poured their resources into their values and vision, and 57 years later, thanks to the spark of that initial grant combined with the vision of the Caldwell scholarship and countless donors, here we are.

The capacity to give across our community is relative, and it is one of the ways the Caldwell Fellows mission is shared. We recognize and honor that career paths vary widely in their compensation. All levels of contributions are valued and celebrated. An astounding number of alumni and friends include the Caldwell Fellows program in their philanthropic giving. Sharing the financial work to keep the vision of Caldwell Fellows alive is one of the values that binds our community. We are named for a role model, not a benefactor. In true land-grant style, we are a community of shared purpose and responsibility. My gratitude is deep for the generosity of resources, spirit, and purposeful living you all embody.
