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My favorite tree is a Ginkgo. A life form of uncommon beauty - its leaf a curved fan of striking geometry.

It is presumptuous and grandiose to compare our program to the longevity of the ginkgo, but in the span of leadership development we are an old tree. The visionaries of the Richardson Foundation, nearly six decades ago, set about embedding a cohort-based program for exceptional students in four NC universities when leadership development, particularly with young adults, had yet to sprout. That was our original seed. That seed landed in the rich soil of NC State and took root, thanks to the favorable conditions of dedicated leaders (Banks Talley and Gerald Hawkins) and the advocacy of the Alumni Association who under the leadership of Bryce Younts garnered the resources from countless NC State alumni to support that young sapling. Like the ginkgo, we have weathered environmental challenges and the rockiness of our own learning journey along the way.

Talking about love in the context of a university leadership development program may sound out of place. For servant-leadership, however, it is a core value and the nutrient we need to survive and thrive through the challenges and unknowns of living and leading in an everchanging world.

"Ginkgophytes were, in their evolutionary heyday, the foremost innovators of the plant kingdom. They could shed leaves in winter, go dormant in low-light seasons, switch between stub growth and branch growth depending on conditions, and resprout from lignotubers — energy-storing roots — after disturbances. On a prior planet with relatively few tall plants and no fast-growing angiosperms, ginkgophytes achieved dominance as generalists." - Jared Farmer

Indeed, one must be a generalist and innovator when it comes to the world of leadership, drawing from the knowledge and energy of other life forms, intertwining our roots for growth and resilience. As our alumni, like ginkgos, you are across the globe, lining the streets of countless cities and country sides. May the rich roots of this program continue to ground us all as we journey our aspirational mission of leadership for the greater good.

From Tailgate Trash to Climate Solutions: One Fellow's Game-Changing Idea

What started as a simple proposal to bring recycling to NC State football tailgates became a career-defining experience for Paul Mobley. The Caldwell Fellow turned his "Chuck It" initiative into a campus-wide sustainability program—despite setbacks that nearly derailed the project. Today, he's a senior research engineer at RTI International leading carbon capture work, and he credits those early lessons in persistence and problem-solving for shaping his approach to environmental innovation. His advice to students? "Find what you're passionate about, and don't stop. Just follow through, even if the road gets bumpy."
